



### Yellow








## Blue

### Did You Know?

IRA owners who are  $70 \frac{1}{2}$  years and older will be able to make tax-free distributions (up to \$100,000) in each of the next two years, 2006 and 2007. Some special rules apply. The gift must be made directly to a qualified

public charity such as Innisfree straight from the IRA, shielding the giver from some of the income tax effects. This provision is currently authorized by Congress for only the next two years.
